

Ysgol Gymraeg Cwmbrân – Pupil Deprivation Grant 2024/25

Part funding of salaries. Staffing levels ensure that pupils are supported in focussed/small groups for literacy and numeracy in each class. All support staff are trained to deliver phonic programmes i.e. RWI and Tric a Chlic to a high level. Support staff to lead on the Ten DD numeracy intervention. Review of outcomes in the previous academic year (2023-2024)				
Attendance:	The difference in attendance between non-FSM and FSM pupils was only 0.74% demonstrating that			
	the interventions and support for FSM pupils and their families are highly effective.			
Extra-curricular learning experiences and	All FSM pupils attended a residential outdoor activity and school trips.			
Curriculum enrichment:	All FSM pupils received music sessions facilitated by external agencies. At various times throughout			
	the year, pupils performed to parents.			
	Specific extra-curricular clubs were established to target FSM pupils e.g. the life skills club			
	FSM pupils have received sessions with Torfaen Play to develop interpersonal and social skills.			
Early years parental engagement:	Uptake was high in the sessions provided for parents/guardians to learn more on how they could			
	support their children in the early years. As a result, more parents/guardians are aware of			
	strategies used in school and replicate these at home.			
Targeted pupils accessed literacy,	School data shows that vulnerable/FSM pupils are making the expected progress according to their			
numeracy and wellbeing intervention	age and ability in all areas. Free School Meals (FSM) and Children Looked After (CLA) pupils made			
programmes:	similar progress to Non-FSM pupils in reading and numeracy interventions.			
	Targeted pupils (18%) received bespoke nurture intervention and COMiT in house. Pupils also			
	received support from external agencies according to need. Use of the 'Ymdopi ac Ymgysylltu' wellbeing programme allowed support staff to tailor sessions to individual/group needs to further support vulnerable and FSM pupils.			
	Staff members trained in Tric a Chlic, RWI, Corrective Reading and Ten DD have been allocated to work with vulnerable pupils.			
	Data analysis from personal assessments showed that:			
	67.6% of FSM pupils in Years 2-6 were achieving the expected or above standardised scores in			
	Welsh reading.			
	84.09% of FSM pupils in Years 4-6 were achieving the expected or above standardised scores in			
	English reading.			
	86.8% of FSM pupils in Years 2-6 were achieving the expected or above standardised scores in the procedural numeracy personal assessment.			
	81.5% of FSM pupils in Years 3-6 were achieving the expected or above standardised scores in the reasoning numeracy personal assessment.
